PREPARATIONS

Introduction

WE ARE SOJOURNERS IN THIS LIFE. Each day, we travel an unfamiliar path toward a sure destination. God is our ever-present companion—guiding and protecting, comforting and convicting us, but we are often unaware of Him.

Prayer is our means of acknowledging God's presence and seeking His help on our daily journey. It is God's way of giving us access to Him. He commands us to pray because He knows that we need Him. We need His redemption, His guidance, His courage, His forgiveness, His sustenance, His peace. He knows that we need what He has—that we have no where else to turn! C. S. Lewis expressed it: "To what will you look for help if you will not look to that which is stronger than yourself?" Simon Peter admitted it: "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life" (John 6:68). And God Him-

self says: "Call to me and I will answer you, and will tell you great and hidden things that you have not known" (Jeremiah 33:3).

In heeding God's command to pray, we become part of a humbling and powerful collaboration:

- God hears us and answers us. (Jeremiah 33:3)
- Jesus prays for us. (Romans 8:34)
- The *Holy Spirit* helps us pray. (Romans 8:26)

My steps have held fast to your paths; my feet have not slipped. I call upon you, for you will answer me, O God; incline your ear to me; hear my words.

PSALM 17:5-6

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In prayer we:

- praise God with the adoration and respect that only a King deserves.
- run to our Judge for the relief of repenting and the resolve to obey.
- ask the Father for things only His children dare ask.
- yield to His greater wisdom and mysterious providences.
- give thanks to the Giver for His unmerited goodness to us.
- find refuge and rejoice in the fact that the Almighty God has heard us.
- take rest in His peace: the great shalom.

MY PATH

The method of prayer, Prayer PathWay, found in this book is one result of more than thirty years of my own prayer journey. As I walked life's path of joy and pain, I longed for a guide that would help me to pray when I couldn't find refrains to reflect my happiness or laments to echo my sorrow. So I read book after book after book searching for prayer guidance. But it was all there in my own Bible: words breathed by God, through men; words that have strengthened and awed God's people throughout the centuries since Christ walked His own earthly path of joy and pain toward the cross. As I opened my eyes to behold the wonders in the Word, I was strengthened for the journey. And my desire for the Word was ignited by seeing what God had for me there.

As I started using my Bible as a prayer book, I saw a path of prayer emerge. I saw that God's people were praising, repenting, asking, yielding, thanking, and rejoicing—over and over, in all situations, through all generations.

Open my eyes, that I may behold wondrous things out of your law. I am a sojourner on the earth; hide not your commandments from me!

PSALM 119:18-19

In my other reading, I saw that since Bible times God's wise ones have attempted to put their journeys into words. Those words have left a trail to strengthen the hearts and fuel the prayers of subsequent sojourners like me. I saw the timeless truth of the Bible underscored but not replaced, echoing down the centuries—pointing me to Christ.

Using the Bible in prayer gave me a prayer voice that was more sure and settled than my own. I began to tread a path of prayer that has helped me to pray through my days.

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I was able to rejoice in hope, to be patient in trials, to be constant in prayer, humbled by the knowledge that Jesus walked this way before and encouraged by the fact that He walks with me now!

GOD IS CALLING US TO PRAY

When God calls us to pray, He isn't calling us to do something *for* Him. He's calling us to receive something *from* Him—something we need: His light for our daily journey.

God knows that we need His light for the uncertain terrain we encounter every day. He has promised: "I will turn the darkness before them into light, the rough places into level ground..." (Isaiah 42:16b).

The Bible is rich with the imagery of walking and of light. We moderns have a hard time appreciating what it would be like to have our feet be our main mode of transport—we use fast cars on smooth highways. And we can't imagine navigating in the dark—we flick a switch to flood our surroundings in light. Imagine walking at night on a rocky trail. The flickering light from a lantern doesn't reveal much of the path, just enough for the next few steps. Truthfully, if we knew what was ahead of us on the path, we might be too frightened to go on! God shows us just enough.

The psalmist said: "Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path" (Psalm 119:105). God has the light we need. We can't create light for our path by rubbing sticks together! But God has provided a steady light through His Word.

Jesus is the Word of God in human form (John 1:1–18). He was sent "to give light to those who sit in darkness... to guide our feet into the way of peace" (Luke 1:79). He said of Himself: "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will not walk in darkness, but will have the light of life" (John 8:12). With Jesus we walk in light.

God has given us the Holy Spirit as our much-needed teacher. He said: "I will put my Spirit within you, and cause you to walk in my statutes and be careful to obey my rules" (Ezekiel 36:27). Again, the walking motif! We are enabled to walk in the truth because of the guidance of the

INTRODUCTION

Helper: "When the Spirit of truth comes, he will guide you into all the truth" (John 16:13).

We, sojourners, have Jesus as our light and the Holy Spirit as our guide as we seek to "walk humbly with [our] God" (Micah 6:8). We are not traveling alone. The presence and the power of the Triune God are ours.

THE BEAUTY OF A WELL-WORN PATH

We've all had the experience of carefully relying on a map or GPS to navigate a complicated route to a new place. Then, gradually, with repeated trips on the same road, we don't need to rely on navigational tools. We have internalized the map. It has become part of us. We know the way.

The same thing happens with prayer.

This guide is not meant to be a formula but a pattern—not a chain but a path—to help you as you make your way. God uses well-established spiritual disciplines to guide us when our emotions run thin and our motivations are weak. Every Christian is prayerless in some, perhaps many, seasons of life. Like any frequently traveled path, a path of prayer allows our faltering steps to progress, even if our hearts are not fully engaged. Often, the heart is sparked by the comforting routine of prayer, courage is restored, joy eventually returns.

We are all, gradually, moving toward hard times in life, if we haven't gone through them already. You won't learn to pray in the emergency room—that's where you'll speechlessly lean into Jesus. You won't learn to

Just because your heart is cold and prayerless, get you into the presence of the loving Father....

pray in your overturned car—that's where you'll just cry out His name. You won't learn to pray in your living room while reeling from a loved one's bad decisions—that's when you'll just weep to God. Learning the way when life is somewhat stable makes us familiar with the path so that we can run straight to Him in the dark, like a night-mare-scared child instinctively making his way to his parents' bed.

We are with God all the way; He is the route, and He is the destination.

THE GUIDE

A Brief Overview

PRAYER PATHWAY is a tool designed to help you pray through your days and through your life. It can be used in many different ways as your prayer needs change. I give some suggestions in the next section and in "Prayer Planning" on page 243.

The heart of this book is PRAYERS, an acrostic for seven areas of prayer (Praise, Repent, Ask, Yield, Express thanks, Rejoice, Shalom). Each section is a portion of a daily prayer journey with Bible passages

to guide your praying and inspiring quotes to encourage you with the thoughts of sages who have traveled this way before you. There is an extra page at the end of each section for you to record additional verses, quotations, and notes.

Proceed through the sections, praying. Linger as your heart requires or hurry as your schedule dictates. Or you may turn right to the section you know you need and pray there. You This Christian way whereon I walk is no untried and uncharted road, but a road beaten hard by the footsteps of saints, apostles, prophets, and martyrs.

might use sticky tabs to mark your stopping place in each section. Please don't allow yourself to get trapped in rigid routines! Following a form doesn't please God. He wants us to come to Him to be unburdened

(Matthew 11:28–30) not to be crushed by greater burdens (Matthew 23:4–12). Conversely, don't confuse spiritual discipline with legalism. Developing strong patterns of spiritual disciplines when our hearts are inclined helps us to press on when our hearts are not.

In every journey there must be a first step.

My experience has also shown that ingrained habits of prayer serve as a beacon when my to-do list threatens to snuff out my prayer time.

Many people find their prayer lives are more focused and disciplined when they have prayer lists and schedules. Also, having a record of God's past faithfulnesses to look back on can do much to bolster faith in Him. So as well as the seven prayer sections, I've provided some forms and resources:

- Prayer Themes: Prayer guides with daily themes for praying for your spouse, your children, or other loved ones.
- Prayer Plan: Reproducible forms for creating a weekly prayer planner and prayer lists for each day of the week.
- Index of Quotations: An alphabetized list of those quoted within this book, along with the source and any notes or comments. I've marked my favorite sources (recommended reading) with .

You may want to fill out the forms right in this book, or you may prefer to print them out to create your own customizable prayer notebook.

THE MAP

A Suggested Itinerary

PRAYERS

Start with Praise, because: "Great is the LORD, and greatly to be praised!" (I Chronicles 16:25a). Read a passage or a quote. If it expresses your heart, pray it. If not, continue reading until you find a portion that is what you would like to say or feel. Worship God!

Then Repent. Repenting has four components—relenting, repenting, receiving, and resolving:

- Pause to relent of any grudges or offenses that have separated you from others. We're told that if we withhold forgiveness, God won't forgive us (Mark 11:25).
- Prayerfully think about areas of sin that you're aware of and ask God to show you sin you might be overlooking. Repent—ask forgiveness with a heart to not repeat the sin—so that "though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they are red like crimson, they shall become like wool" (Isaiah 1:18).
- Gratefully accept God's forgiveness for your repented sin. We have His assurance that "if we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness" (1 John 1:9).

• With repentance comes resolving: accepting God's forgiveness and heeding Jesus' admonition to: "Go, and from now on sin no more" (John 8:11).

Now Ask! As a loving father, God gives good gifts to those who ask (Matthew 7:11). As you ask, endeavor to align your will to His—is what you're asking for His glory and your good? Ask.

Yield is the next step. Yielding is saying "Yes!" to God: "Yes" to what you want, "Yes" (or, "I am willing...") to what you don't want. In that way, you are saying "Yes" to His greater wisdom. As Jesus subjected His will to His Father, so must we. "Not my will, but yours, be done" (Luke 22:42b).

Pause to Express Thanks. We "give thanks to the LORD, for he is good" (Psalm 136:1a). You may want to start a gratitude journal to keep an ongoing list of God's goodness toward you.

Next, Rejoice. As you reach the end of your prayer time, the verses in this section provide assurance that God is your refuge. And there you can "Rejoice, always" (1 Thessalonians 5:16).

And, finally, Shalom. Shalom means peace. Close your prayer time in God's peace with a trusting "Amen." "Blessing and glory and wisdom and thanksgiving and honor and power and might be to our God forever and ever! Amen" (Revelation 7:12).

RESOURCES

Each day, pray for the people you've listed on that day's prayer list. You might find it helpful to leave this book or your own prayer notebook open in a convenient place to remind you to pray throughout your day. Record speLet people pray—

cific prayer requests or answers on the sheets provided, if you'd like.

If you'd prefer, consult one of the prayer theme guides. Each contains a month's list of daily topics to pray for a spouse, family, or for others.

SOME ALTERNATE ROUTES:

Seven Prayers

Psalm 119:164 says: "Seven times a day I praise you for your righteous rules." There is a sweet cadence in dividing our days into seven portions (as many religious orders have done for centuries). Instead of praying through the PathWay in one daily prayer time, consider dividing your day into seven prayer pauses. I've found it helpful to set the alarm on my phone to call me to prayer at seven points in my day. I either pray through one section of PRAYERS when the alarm rings, or I pray for a certain person or need.

Or you might benefit from focusing on one section of the PathWay for each day of the week.

Praying for Others

Prayer PathWay is helpful when praying in a focused way for a specific need or for a specific person; your prayer time can become a mini prayer retreat. Follow PRAYERS as you pray for that person or need. It works this way: Start I always feel it well just to put a few words of prayer between everything I do.

by praising God for that person, then repent of any way you may have wronged that person, then make requests of God in relation to that person or need, and so on, continuing through each section of the path.

Train yourself to pray for a certain need or person while doing a specific daily task: when making the bed, pray for your spouse; when driving by your neighbors' house, pray for them; when brushing your teeth, pray for control of your mouth; when cooking, pray for spiritual sustenance for your relatives, and so on. As you weave your prayer time into your daily routines, and as you open your eyes and heart, you will be amazed to see how God inspires you to pray. It's humbling to realize that you might be the only one praying for a specific person or need. Soon, praying becomes an integral and effortless part of your daily tasks—the *main* thing!

Praying with Others

As you become familiar with Prayer PathWay, use it to pray *with* others, too. Family or small group worship times can become prayer excursions as you make a trip together through the path.

We are exhorted to: "Pray without ceasing" (I Thessalonians 5:17), because God knows how much we need Him on this joyful, bewildering, sometimes dangerous, frequently arduous path of life.

Until you believe that life is war, you cannot know what prayer is for. JOHN PIPER

You make known to me the path of life; in your presence there is fullness of joy; at your right hand are pleasures forevermore. (Psalm 16:11)

Each day represents a day trip—the accumulation of these fleeting days is our life's journey. Today is all I have! Either I will walk through this day in prayer, or I won't. I can't pray yesterday. I can't pray tomorrow. Today is all I have.

O LORD, make me know my end and what is the measure of my days; let me know how fleeting I am! (Psalm 39:4)

My hope and prayer for you, fellow sojourner, is that this guide will help you to tread a well-worn pathway of prayer, which God will use to guide you, to comfort you, to keep you from sin, to forgive you, to be your refuge, to give you peace; to give you Himself.

"The path of the righteous is like the light of dawn, which shines brighter and brighter until full day." Proverbs 4:18

A GENTLE REMINDER

Please don't try to do all of *Prayer PathWay* at once. It's simply meant to be used as a guide in whatever way would be helpful now and to be adjusted for your future prayer needs.

THE FACT THAT you're opening a book on prayer could mean that you already pray and are looking for some fresh encouragement; or that you want to pray and are seeking motivation; or that you want to want to pray (which, in itself, reveals a desire to pray!) and are searching for inspiration. Or it could mean that someone who loves you gave you this book because he or she wants you to pray, so you're giving it a try. In any case, welcome! I hope you'll join me on the path of prayer.

From an earthly perspective, a life of faith begins with prayer—and is sustained by prayer. Some Christians can remember the exact date of their first authentic prayer of faith—the day of their conversion. Others don't remember but have heard people (usually their parents) recount those first steps of faith. Others don't remember not being in faith; their memory is of always being in Christ. Any of those stories can reflect saving and authentic conversion, because our conversion

is simply our seeing our need and God's meeting it.

Of course, none of us knows when his or her redemption really began because none of us was there! Our redemption began in the mind of God before creation. He made a plan. His Son was born to make it happen. Jesus walked our path of

redemption right to the cross and has gone ahead of us into eternity. He is the Way and the destination. He is the path—and He is the prize!

Christ is the path and Christ the prize.

My plea to you is this: consider whether

you've been redeemed by Christ, redeemed from your self-reliance and your self-made plans, saved from your sins, secured for eternity.

If you're a Christian, you'll often run to God for needful repentance (we'll talk about that later in this book). But if you aren't redeemed, that's the first thing to address. You may not know much about God, but you know about yourself. You know—deep down—that something is wrong. That sense is God drawing you. Listen.

You need what God has. He is what you need.

Your prayer of redemption needs no perfect words, just your acknowledgement of your sin, your awareness of God's solution, and your desire to surrender to Him.

Ponder these passages and pray your heart out to Him. Confess your sin and ask for forgiveness—and ask for the faith to believe all that God is and the strength to obey all that He asks.

All people are sinners. Sin separates us from God.

Your iniquities have made a separation between you and your God, and your sins have hidden his face from you so that he does not hear.

Isaiah 59:2

God's love made a plan.

God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us.

Romans 5:8

For the Son of Man came to seek and to save the lost. Luke 19:10

In this is love, not that we have loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the [perfect sacrifice] for our sins.

PRAISE

God Is Enthroned

WE WERE CREATED TO WORSHIP. We will either worship God or we'll worship His creation, which is idolatry. All of God's creation was made to praise Him. Psalm 148 describes this beautifully:

Praise the LORD!

Praise the LORD from the heavens;

praise him in the heights!

Praise him, all his angels;

praise him, all his hosts!

A soul redeemed demands a life of praise.

Praise him, sun and moon, praise him, all you shining stars! Praise him, you highest heavens, and you waters above the heavens! (vv. 1–4)

Praise the LORD from the earth, you great sea creatures and all deeps, fire and hail, snow and mist, stormy wind fulfilling his word!

Mountains and all hills, fruit trees and all cedars!

Beasts and all livestock, creeping things and flying birds!

Kings of the earth and all peoples, princes and all rulers of the earth! Young men and maidens together, old men and children! (vv. 7–12) Let everything that has breath praise the LORD! PSALM 150:6a

In commanding

us to glorify Him,

Praise the LORD! (v. 14b)

All that God created is mentioned: angels, the heavens, sun and moon and stars, animals, the elements, earth and plants and trees, people both young and old. In praising God, we are joining His people who have, over the centuries, lifted their hearts and voices in worship. Children, young people, old people, mystics, pragmatics—in days of ease or years of suffering, free or imprisoned, healthy or ill, rich or poor. God's people have praised Him everywhere: in homes and in catacombs, in prisons and in hospitals, in caves and in meadows, in airplanes and in taxis, in synagogues and in church buildings.

The condition of our life, the location of our body, or the mood of our spirit doesn't determine our praise—our being does. We were created to praise.

praise—our being does. We were created to praise.

To praise God is to proclaim my admiration of to enjoy Him.

Him. It is to take my focus off of myself to think about Him: His attributes, His works, His stead-

fastness. Praise is pushing back my daily worries and impending tasks to acknowledge my always present, never-changing God. Setting my mind's attention and my heart's affection Godward leads to praise.

ASSUMING A POSTURE OF PRAISE

We are a casual culture. We have little experience with the formality that is due a king. As His children, there are times when we can race into the throne room and implore our Father about a pressing need but, for the most part, our posture in worship should be one of reverence. In the Bible, God is always approached in prayer with humility. The posture

of our physical body helps focus our worship, but it is the posture of the heart that is crucial. In worship, we are approaching the Almighty God!

- God said to Moses: "Take your sandals off your feet, for the place on which you are standing is holy ground" (Exodus 3:5).
- The angels in Isaiah covered their faces in praise: "Each [seraphim] had six wings: with two he covered his face, and with two he covered his feet, and with two he flew" (Isaiah 6:2).
- Paul reminds us "that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth" (Philippians 2:10).

At times, our praise comes effortlessly; at times praise is a decision, an act of the will, an obedient response to God's surpassing worthiness. God does not require us to praise Him in a formulaic fashion. We can praise Him just as honestly in despair as in joy.

- We can praise God in simple, overflowing awe, as Mary did: "My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior" (Luke 1:46–47).
- We can praise God in suffering, as Paul and Silas did in jail: "About midnight Paul and Silas were praying and singing hymns to God" (Acts 16:25a).
- We can praise as we ponder a passage such as: "Ah, Lord God! It is you who have made the heavens and the earth by your great power and by your outstretched arm! Nothing is too hard for you" (Jeremiah 32:17).
- We can praise by whispering a phrase: "Blessed be the name of God forever and ever" (Daniel 2:20b).
- We can praise by uttering a name of God: El Shaddai (Almighty One), El Elyon (The Most High God), Adonai (Master). See page 34.
- We can praise by meditating on an attribute of God: "The LORD is merciful" (Psalm 103:8a). See pages 36–37.
- We can praise by musing over the "I am" statements of Christ: "I am the Bread of Life," "I am the Light of the world," and so on. See page 34.

- We can praise in song, as the Israelites did: "Then Moses and the people of Israel sang this song to the LORD, saying, 'I will sing to the LORD, for he has triumphed gloriously; the horse and his rider he has thrown into the sea. The LORD is my strength and my song, and he has become my salvation; this is my God, and I will praise him, my father's God, and I will exalt him'" (Exodus 15:1–2).
- We can praise God by crying out His greatness: "For great is the LORD, and greatly to be praised" (Psalm 96:4a).
- We can praise God by reminding ourselves to praise Him: "I call upon the LORD, who is worthy to be praised" (2 Samuel 22:4a).

Read through the *Praise* verses until you feel your heart say: "Yes—that's what I'm trying to say!" and echo those words of praise. If you're able, don't rush away—let your heart wander to worship.
