



Introduction

How being a parent makes one pray—without ceasing! The prayers of this volume reach out to the Lord for our young adult children: from late teens into early adulthood. In these years, children leap into independence, pursue life callings, and often leave home. Prayer has been crucial from the beginning, but as these young adults begin to find their own pathways, we parents even more deeply understand the importance and the comfort of praying for our children. How amazing to think that Christian parents can keep reaching out in prayer to God our Father, who has shown his love to us in his own Son—and who gives us his Holy Spirit to help us pray, according to his Word.

These prayers have grown from my heart through years of praying for three sons—and now for their growing families. I know that you parents (and grandparents, and aunts and uncles, and spiritual mothers and fathers!) will surely pray for your children in your own words and with your own specific praises and petitions. My hope is that these prayers might mingle profitably with yours, as we all lift up the next generations to the Lord who knows and loves them perfectly.

These prayers grow out of the Scriptures; each is printed

with a brief related Bible passage and reflects that passage in its content. What confidence, that when we don't know how to pray for our children, the Spirit and the Word guide and help us. Just as the Scriptures show us Jesus Christ at the very center, so these prayers aim to focus on Jesus—his love, his work of salvation on our behalf, his glory, his blessed rule in every area of our lives, his coming again.

The prayers apply to sons and daughters both; they alternate, but any of them can easily be changed by switching the pronouns appropriately. Please note: the prayers are written in one parent's voice, although they can certainly be prayed by parents together. Parents, please know that these prayers, as they focus on our children, inevitably focus often on us parents too. Prayer stretches our hearts in all kinds of ways.

Our soul waits for the LORD; he is our help and our shield. For our heart is glad in him, because we trust in his holy name. Let your steadfast love, O LORD, be upon us, even as we hope in you. (Ps. 33:20–22)

How beautifully the psalmist teaches us to wait on the Lord and hope in the Lord—and how crucial are these lessons in relation to parenting!

We begin this volume with a psalm that turns us toward true hope. These young adult years are the ones in which we might hope to see the fruit of our labors in our children. But it is good for us to step back and remember where our hope ultimately lies: in the unfailing faithfulness and steadfast love of our sovereign God who sent his only Son to save us. We can trust in his holy name, all the days of our lives and of our children's lives.

O Lord my God, in you I rest my soul, for only you are my help and shield; my heart is glad in you.
As I fill up the years with prayers for my dear child,
I trust you,
all because of who you are,
O Lord my God,
the God of steadfast love
who gave your only Son for our salvation.

I'm praying always that your steadfast love would be upon my child, both now and evermore.
I tell you, Lord, in faith, my trust and hope lie not in how, according to your providence, you send the answer to my prayers; I hope in you.

O Lord my God,
I thank you that you hear my prayers.
I thank you that you've granted me the blessing large of showing off your steadfast love before my child, imperfectly, but by your grace.
May I be an ever-faithful witness, even as I pray, and as I wait and hope in you.

May our sons in their youth be like plants full grown, our daughters like corner pillars cut for the structure of a palace. (Ps. 144:12)

We sometimes say we would like to keep them young and close, but we know we're aiming for much more than that. We're aiming to see them grow into women and men of mature faith, ready to go out and serve the God who made them.

We're aiming, as Psalm 144 pictures it, for sons who are like full-grown plants, sturdy and fruitful, and for daughters who are like the pillars of a palace, strong and noble. We're aiming for children full of spiritual life and strength, who will play their parts well in showing and sharing that life and strength, all through the power of Jesus Christ our risen Savior and Lord.

May we pray for the maturity of our children with the kind of faith-filled vision that Scripture encourages in us.

For Strong Faith

For her maturity I pray, O Lord—that she would grow not just in body strong but even more in soul. Please never cease to grow in her a soul of faith that presses on in knowing you and building up your church and aiming for the day she'll see your face.

No longer a child tossed about by every new idea, every wind of doctrine, may she live as one who's planted firm among your people, Lord, all united by your breathed-out Word and growing up in every way together into Christ our head.

With strength of soul give her humility, daily acknowledgement of sins and failings which, I pray, will take her only, always, to the cross where Christ our Savior died for us; may she not forget that cross, and not forget the empty tomb that shows Christ risen, conquering death, the living Lord of our salvation.

Father, be her guide as she walks onward, strong because she's looking to her risen Savior, strengthened by your Spirit, aiming for the day she sees you face to face.

Again Jesus spoke to them, saying, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will not walk in darkness, but will have the light of life." (John 8:12)

Reading this, you may be a believing parent who grieves over your grown child's unbelief and who yearns for God to invade that child's heart. Nothing makes us yearn more.

And nothing makes us turn more fervently to the truths on which we stake our lives: God's sovereignty, God's love shown in his Son, God's power to accomplish all his perfect will.

God sent his Son, who is the light of the world. Let us pray that God will shine that light into this child's heart.

For an Unbelieving Child

Break your light upon my child's heart, O Lord who only said, "Let there be light," and there was light. You sent your light into this world, a light that shines in darkness and is not ever overcome.

O shine the light of Jesus in his heart, merciful Father, by your Spirit, that my child may believe.

Thank you, sovereign God, that you hold my beloved child in your hand. You always have, and all my efforts—sometimes feeble or foolish, sometimes wise—you know, you use, according to your plan. I know that you are sovereign and that you are good, and so I still my yearning soul before your throne.

In you is life, fully revealed and given in your Son who died for sinners who deserve that death, who rose that sinners who believe might live. Enlarge my heart, I pray, to yearn for many sinners to believe and live.

But now I stop to pray again, and I will pray again, O Lord of life: please shine the light of Jesus in his heart, that my child may believe. For the LORD gives wisdom; from his mouth come knowledge and understanding. (Prov. 2:6)

They will probably be reading a lot in these years. Hopefully these young adults will make their way through many whole books along with all the shorter snippets and articles and blogs. And hopefully one book, the Bible, will be opened and read again and again.

We all know the temptation to let other words crowd out God's Word. In our interconnected world, we (younger and older alike) often begin the morning and mark the segments of our day by checking on words—whether messages from friends and family or perhaps items of interesting news. More words are always waiting.

In the midst of all the other words, it is the Bible that will give us wisdom, direct from God's mouth. These are the words of life. May our children know this, and may they discipline themselves (and delight themselves) in reading and studying the Scriptures regularly and deeply.
